Right after the release of his first single in 2020, we had the opportunity to interview him but the interview was never released. Though he has grown a lot musically since then, we still wanted to share what he had to tell us.



For those who might not know you or your music, tell us a bit about yourself and how you got into music!

Well, my name is Jayden Palmer! I'm originally from Northern Cali but I live in Tennessee. I'm 18 years old, I skate everyday, and I just graduated high school. As far as getting into music, my dad taught me the basics of drums and guitar when I was about 7 and since then I've been completely self-taught through Youtube! I started producing and writing when I was about 10 on my iPad mini and I started taking music more seriously about a year ago. You just released your first single, "Ig This Is It" this past May! What was your experience creating and producing the song like?

l wrote that song around 2am one night while I was DEEPLY overthinking my relationship at the time. This caused the lyrics to be all about run-



ning out of steam and the driving factors in a relationship and realizing that it might be time to let go. Producing-wise, it was a BLAST! The chords were an accidentwhile I was just randomly pressing keys to make sure I could hear it through my speakers HAHA! Much of the production was inspired by Jon Bellion including a silick distorted recording of me beatboxing that can be heard all throughout the song.

What are some of your favorite artists, songs, or albums?

Currently, my favorite artists ae Still Woozy, Jeremy Zucker, Aries, and Jon Bellion. I think you can find a piece of each of them in the music that I make! One of my favorite albums is "The Story of Us" by QuinnXCII and my all time favorite song is "Black Licorice" by Peach Plt.

My inspiration almost always comes from my own personal experiences or feelings! I've always had trouble communicating my emotions and I feel like making music is the only true way that I can express myself.

I am not! But it's always been a dream to put a band together and start playing shows so hopefully that can happen once Covid is over!

Is there any advice anyone's ever given to you that has really stuck with you or anyone in particular you really look up to when it comes to music?

KyleBeats! Kyle is a YouTube producer that I've watched for YEARS and has brought me so much inspiration. I think he's just a perfect example of how "in reach" your dream goals are if you work hard and keep trying.



Has quarantine changed your creative process at all? What are you most excited for post-Covid?

It hasn't changed too much! I think it was a little difficult to adjust mentally in the beginning but that just made for better song topics, haha! And I'm definitely looking forward to traveling with friends.
